## **HEALTHY TEEN RELATIONSHIP ACT**

Teen dating violence is a significant issue, and describes when individuals mistreat their young dating partners—physically, mentally, emotionally, or sexually. These violent relationships have lasting effects, leading to substance abuse, eating disorders, risky behavior, and a higher risk of future domestic violence. Half of those facing both dating violence and rape attempt suicide.

Because of prevalence and severe long-term impacts of teen dating violence, Oregon passed HB 4077 (Healthy Teen Relationship Act) in 2013, which mandates that each school district adopt a policy addressing teen dating violence (ORS 339.366).

# Healthy Teen Relationship HB 4077 (ORS 339.366) mandates that all Oregon school district boards or private schools shall adopt a policy (JFCF) that contains the following:

- States that teen dating violence is unacceptable and is prohibited and that each student has the right to a safe learning environment.
- 2. Incorporates age-appropriate education about teen dating violence and domestic violence into new or existing training programs for students in grades 7 through 12.
- Establishes procedures for how employees of a school are to respond to incidents of teen dating violence that take place at the school, on school grounds, at school-sponsored activities or in vehicles used for school-provided transportation.
- 4. Identifies job titles for the school officials who are responsible for receiving reports related to teen dating violence (ORS 339.356 (District policy required)).
- Notifies students and parents of the teen dating violence and domestic violence policies adopted by the board or school.

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### **Teen Dating Violence Statistics & Facts**

- Teen dating violence does not necessitate a sexual relationship.
- Teen dating violence affects approximately 1.5 million high school students annually.
- One in three girls' experiences abuse, with one in ten students purposefully harmed by a partner.
- Girls aged 16-24 face a significantly higher rate of intimate partner violence.
- Half of youths experiencing both dating violence and rape attempt suicide.
- Only 33% of abused teens disclose the abuse.
